#### K-6 Art Outline:

In experiencing the BOLD exhibition, students are introduced to an appreciation of the different kinds of artworks, and how the artists world can be interpreted.

#### Syllabus Links:

#### Students learn about:

- students will develop knowledge, skills and understanding in appreciating their own artworks and those of others, recognising the roles of artists, audiences and how the world can be interpreted.
- Students should be exposed to a wide range of artists, artworks and artistic practices in Australian cultures
- Students can also visit art galleries and museums in urban and regional locations and relevant internet sites. These opportunities also lead to culturally rich and imaginative learning experiences that assist students to enjoy and value the visual arts in their own lives.

#### **Objectives:**

#### Students learn to:

- Students can think about themselves as members of an audience and recognise that in societies many people are interested in looking at and talking about art
- They can reflect on their own experiences as audience members and begin to understand how artworks act as representations

#### Activities:

#### Before your visit:

- Introduce students to the Colour Wheel (see Resources below) and experiment with making different colours by mixing paints
- Discuss with students how certain colours can make us feel an emotion, or remind us of something we associate with this colour ask students to name associations with colours
- Look at examples from packaging or logos that use colours and ask students why those colours might be used

#### During your visit:

- Students can fill in the 1-2-3 Reflection worksheet as they view the exhibit
- Teachers can discuss and point out different colours, textures and styles and ask students what they think the artist is representing in their own worlds
- Students can try and list as many colours as they can that are represented in the exhibition

#### After your visit:


- Teachers can recap some of the different examples of art they have seen, what students thought of the exhibit
- Go through their 1-2-3 Reflection worksheet and discuss what they found interesting and questions they have about the exhibit
- Students can then do an artwork of their own that uses colour to represent an emotion or experience
- Students can take their understanding and put it into designing a new package for a product of their/teacher's choosing
